

THE MYTH OF THE PHOENIX

William Shakespeare made one of the most prominent references in both his plays *The Tempest*, incorporating a number of other mythical creatures but placing the phoenix separate and above the rest, and in *Timon of Athens*, when a senator metaphorically calls Timon "a naked gull, which flashes now a phoenix. According to ancient beliefs, the Phoenix symbolized many things through its different names. Metaphorical Storytelling The most common source that is credited for the inspiration of the Phoenix is simply metaphorical storytelling that was used to describe the spirituality of ancient cultures. Such is the story they tell of the doings of this bird. Some sources claim that the eyes of the Phoenix are a brilliant shade of yellow, while others claim that they are like two shining sapphires. When it finished building its nest, it sets itself on fire similar to the first version allowing the next Phoenix to come forward. It would then sing one of the most beautiful and haunting melodies known to man " so perfect that even the sun god had to pause and listen to the sweet notes. Lastly, the Phoenix is known to have a different diet than the birds of this world. According to tradition, once Eve ate the apple the forbidden fruit offered by the serpent, she tempted the other creatures in the garden to do so. Alternate Variations of the Story While the above tale is the most common version of the rebirth of the Phoenix, there are alternative versions that are also passed down. The phoenix was compared to undying Rome, and it appears on the coinage of the late Roman Empire as a symbol of the Eternal City. A variant of the story made the dying phoenix fly to Heliopolis and immolate itself in the altar fire, from which the young phoenix then rose. Megafauna There are also those who speculate that the story of the Phoenix was perhaps inspired by a species of megafauna that is no longer living. Jane Seymour 's heraldic badge includes a phoenix rising from a castle, between two red and white Tudor roses. Sylvia Plath also alludes to the phoenix in the end of her famous poem *Lady Lazarus*. Even thus by the great sages 'tis confessed The phoenix dies, and then is born again, When it approaches its five-hundredth year; On herb or grain it feeds not in its life, But only on tears of incense and amomum ,. The Phoenix, like all other creatures who live in Paradise, was known to live a good life. However, this explosion is not the end of life, as it makes way for a new world to be created. The tears of the bird are also thought to have regenerative abilities that can be harnessed by humans. In three days, the Phoenix will rise from the ashes " born again.
